

GUIDE FOR REFLECTION ARTICLES

This type of article presents the results of theoretical and conceptual reflections developed from an analytical, interpretative, or critical perspective. Its main objective is to defend novel **theses and interpretations that may contribute to both traditional and emerging debates in Psychology**. The manuscript should rely on original sources and have a propositional character, considering that theoretical reflection contributes to the production of new knowledge based on theoretical and experimental evidence. The structure of the reflection article will follow the argumentative development provided by the author. However, it should consider the inclusion of the following elements:

Abstract: The article must include an **abstract in Spanish, English, and Portuguese**, without headings or subtitles (minimum: 230 words; maximum: 250 words), describing the objective of the research, methodology, main results, and key conclusions. At the end of the abstract, between **4 and 6 keywords (in Spanish, English, and Portuguese)** should be included, with the most significant standardized terms associated with the study's topics. It is recommended to use the APA thesaurus (<https://psycnet.apa.org/home>) or the UNESCO thesaurus (<https://vocabularies.unesco.org/browser/thesaurus/en/>) as a guide.

Introduction/Literature Review: It should include the justification for the article and describe the sequence of arguments to be developed, along with a literature review that includes a synthesis of the main theories, discussions, and evidence (both classic and contemporary) related to the research topic.

Discussion: In this section, authors should develop each of their arguments and proposed theses in depth. The novelty of the study, the theoretical and practical contributions derived from it, and the projections for future studies should be specified.

Conclusions: It should include a summary of the main points and arguments developed throughout the text.

References (must include URL or DOI): The article must include **a minimum of 30 references**, of which at least **80% should correspond to works published in the last 10 years**.

It is also recommended to consider the following guidelines:

- **Encabezamientos:** Se debe utilizar un sistema decimal de encabezamientos con un máximo de tres niveles.
- **Abbreviations:** Abbreviations should be defined at their first mention and used consistently thereafter.
- **Footnotes:** Footnotes may be used to provide additional information, which may include citing a reference listed in the references section. Footnotes in the text will be numbered consecutively; footnotes in tables will be indicated with lowercase letters in superscript (or asterisks for significance values and other statistical data).
